WANTS SERBIA WIPED OUT.

Bulgar Paper Insists No Mercy Must Be Shown at Peace Conference.

Serbia must be entirely wiped off the map in order to insure peace in the Balkans and Bulgarian diplomats must insist upon this condition at the peace council which will end the war, according to the opinion expressed by the Narodni Prava of Sofia in an article quoted in a recent issue of The London Daily Chronicle. The Sofia newspaper, which is referred to as the organ of the Bulgarian Government, says:

"Very soon the Bulgarian diplomats will have to speak at the general peace conference. They will have to demonstrate and theoretically prove the Bulgarian claims which have already been fully established by the force of our The question of Serbia's future arms. and our relations with the neighboring States will all have to be discussed and definitely formulated. In these matters, especially in regard to the future of our real enemy—Serbia—our diplomats will have to be circumspect and, most important of all, strictly inexorable. Our diplomats will have to lay aside all sentiment. timent, all human consideration feeling. The continued existence of Serbia, no matter in what form, means the subversion of all peace in the Balkans, constant quarrels, and conflicts between Bulgaria and other nations, and a permanent obstacle to the pros-perity and peaceful development of Eu-

rope.

"That State, which since the beginning of its independent existence, has been a breeding place of dissension and strife, must be wiped from off the face of the earth, in order to establish an understanding or peaceable cultural work in other nations of Europe and the Balkans. This is neither mailce nor barbarity on our part. It is one of the main necessities for the future of humain necessities for the future of humanity, and principally for ourselves and our neighbors. The relations between Germany and her Western neighbor are similar to those between Bulgaria and Serbia. That is why it is the bounden duty of our diplomats to take to heart Bismarck's motto: 'No generosity at the conclusion of peace.'
