THE MASSACRE OF JEWS.

Action of the Israelites of the United States—The American Consul at Bucharest.

WASHINGTON, June 2.—Leading Israelites of Louisville have, it appears from dispatches received here today, telegraphed to every city in the West to arouse their Representatives in Congress to do all they can with a view to prevent further massacre of Israelites in Roumania. Mr. S. WOLF, of this City, has received a number of other telegrams, including one from M. S. ISAACS, Secretary of the Jewish Board of Delegates of the United States, as follows:

"Ask the President to instruct the Minister at Constantinople to help the Boumania Jews."

Also one from HENRY GREENBAUM, a leading banker of Chicago, namely:

"Please ask my personal friends in Congress to cooperate with you in representations to the President or otherwise, that the persecution and butchery of our brethren in Roumania be stopped."

The President and various members of Congress have also received similar telegrams. Mr. WOLF, a prominent Israelite of Washington, has been actively engaged all day in Executive and legislative circles, and has assurances that such action as may be consistent with usage will be He has addressed a letter in appeal to taken. Chairman of the Senator SUMNER. 28 Committee on Foreign Relations, with a view declaration of legislative sympathy. to **a** He also called on the Secretary of State today, and presented the telegrams from various parts of the United States asking for the intercession of the United States in behalf of that people. In consequence of this, it has been determined to appoint ADOLPHE BUCHNER, who is an Israelite, Consul at Bucharest, Roumania.
